OBJECTIVES OF ENGAGEMENT

- To inform the public and stakeholders of the aims of the project and key changes
- To seek feedback on draft concept designs
- To understand overall opportunities and benefits and any concerns that could be mitigated in the design and construction phase

SCOPE

Negotiable - what the community and stakeholders can influence:

- Construction impact identification and mitigation
- Concept and detailed design of the ANARE Shed and surrounds
- Education programs
- Cosmetics of the developments
- Features and functionality of the project
- Trail structure

Non-negotiable - what the community and stakeholders cannot influence:

- Project objectives
- Funding commitments
- Compliance with legislation including engagement elements existing within current legislation as relevant1
- Mitigation of construction impacts
- Safety of the site
- Use of user profiling and segmentation data, forecast visitation growth and development opportunities to inform the project.

LEVEL OF ENGAGEMENT

- Openness Willing to seek the views of those affected by decisions, and open to providing them with relevant information to support this process.
- Accountability Having clear objectives, following through on commitments made at the outset of the engagement, and being clear about the responsibilities of stakeholders in the process.
- Inclusiveness Proactively seeking out those affected by the decision and providing meaningful opportunities, accessible channels and time for their involvement.

PROJECT BACKGROUND

Project scope

The Falls Creek Alpine Resort Management Board (FCARMB) developed a detailed Masterplan in 2016 as part of their strategic planning initiatives. This plan included a focus area for the development of the Rocky Valley Lake foreshore for year-round usage. After overwhelming support from the Falls Creek Community Recovery committee, funding was successfully sought from Bushfire Recovery Victoria for the Lakeside Trail Head and Foreshore Redevelopment Project.

The foreshore has significant summer water sports activities including boating, swimming, and fishing. However, visitor facilities are rudimentary and infrastructure enhancements would greatly improve access to this iconic location for the community and visitors alike.

of the successful proposal included provision for a year-round trailhead for the Falls to Hotham Alpine Crossing in this location. The proposal also provided for a visitor information precinct, an education and interpretation centre and a meeting place for traditional owners. Other value adds include the provision of public facilities to support the winter alpine visitor market and the

operation of a unique destination supported by a food and beverage offer unparalleled in the Victorian high country.

A key part of this facility development is the refurbishment of an aging shed on the foreshore, previously used by the Australian National Antarctic Research Expedition (ANARE) organisation for training requirements. The shed has considerable rustic charm but needs to be modernised and improved to better match commercial/trailhead activation requirements. This facility would also benefit Falls Creek community bushfire emergency response due to its safe location in the landscape.

The facility is intended to function as a trail head for the iconic Falls to Hotham Alpine Crossing, incorporating information on the Bogong High Plains, the alpine environment, climate change and adaptation initiatives, together with celebrating aboriginal history and the importance of the high plains in their shared history.

Overall Project Objectives

- Enhanced community recreational facilities and safety
- Increased year-round visitation
- Increased employment and commercialisation opportunities
- Increased guest experience and aligned products for the stated activations to facilitate and attract 'green season' visitation
- Increased carparking capacity at the Resort to facilitate events at the lake and resort visitation by providing extra parking during peak visitation periods
- Improved environmental and climate change education opportunities for visitors.

Key project actions

Upgrade the ANARE shed including:

- Provision of upgraded public toilets
- Upgrade building structure and external cladding
- Provision of power, heating, water and wastewater utilities
- Upgrade internal lighting and internal finishes to facilitate commercial and visitor centre activation
- Integration of outdoor decking and furniture
- Provision of high capacity wi-fi facilities for both public and commercial use

Consideration of winter and summer user requirements including:

- Increase carparking capacity
- Develop all season car parking to allow for up to 150 additional parking spaces.
- Provision of curbing and stormwater to suit snow clearing operations
- Use of green recycled asphalt and concrete for carpark surfaces

Improve road access including:

- Upgrade road to all seasons use with green recycled asphalt
- Consider improvements/infrastructure integration for both mountain biking, water activations and cross-country skiing in this area
- Consideration of snow clearing requirements for all season activation

Improve foreshore safety including:

• Integration of key infrastructure projects including a pontoon jetty, boat ramp and visitor amenities.

Provide shelter in place facilities including:

- Ensure space configuration for community use during bushfire emergencies
- Consider requirements for emergency services

BENEFITS

- The year-round benefits will be more commercial opportunities, more local jobs through the construction, development and commercialisation phases of the project and significantly improved community and user amenities. The provision of public facilities will support the winter alpine visitor market and the operation of a unique destination for food and beverage offers unparalleled in the Victorian high country.
- The extension of essential services to this precinct provides for other development opportunities, i.e. Nordic Bowl, and their integration.
- The provision of car parking and water access infrastructure will improve the safety of the precinct.
- The development of parking infrastructure will greatly improve accessing the precinct and supplement capacity at peak times.
- This facility would also benefit Falls Creek community bushfire emergency response due to its safe location in the landscape.

KEY MESSAGES

- The Falls Creek Alpine Resort Management Board (FCARMB) are developing the Rocky Valley Lake foreshore for year-round usage.
- After overwhelming support from the Falls Creek Community Recovery committee, funding was successfully sought from Bushfire Recovery Victoria for the Lakeside Trail Head and Foreshore Redevelopment Project.
- The project will expand the significant summer water sports activities by developing the rudimentary visitor facilities and by including a year-round trailhead for the Falls to Hotham Alpine Crossing.
- A key part of this facility development is the refurbishment of the Australian National Antarctic Research Expedition (ANARE) shed, that needs to be modernised and improved to better match commercial/trailhead activation requirements.
- The project will also have a visitor information precinct, an education and interpretation centre and a meeting place for traditional owners.
- There are five phases to the engagement including: early engagement, planning permit engagement, detailed design engagement, construction engagement, operational engagement. A range of engagement and communications methods will be used.
- Overall engagement objectives are to inform the public and stakeholders of the aims of the project and key changes, to seek feedback on draft concept designs, to understand overall opportunities and benefits and any concerns that could be mitigated in the design and construction phase.
